Canine Chronic hepatitis: causes and treatments

Chronic hepatitis in dogs is common but often frustrating as many cases are idiopathic. This lecture hopes to open your eyes to potential causes in more cases such as infectious agents and toxins. Treatment will be discussed in detail including when to use steroids or copper chelators. The aim is to increase the confidence of practitioners in diagnosing and treating their canine liver cases.

Speaker: Dr Penny Watson MA, VetMD, CertVR, DSAM, DipECVIM, FRCVS



Dr Penny Watson is a Senior Lecturer in Small Animal Medicine at the Queen's Veterinary School Hospital, Cambridge where she helps run a busy internal medicine teaching and referral clinic. After graduating from Cambridge in 1989, she spent 4 years in mixed practice before returning to Cambridge. She has been there ever since and is now an RCVS and European Recognised Specialist in Small Animal Medicine. Penny is a Fellow of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons and ECVIM President. Penny's research focuses on liver and pancreas disease in dogs and cats, particularly chronic disease and fibrosis.
